2020 a Year of Vision Despite COVID

Prevent Blindness Georgia began our 2020 fiscal and program year which started on April 1, 2019 and ended on March 31, 2020, with a great deal of excitement. After all, the year number 20/20 has special meaning in the world of vision and the organization has made tremendous strides in the last few years, expanding our programs' reach and increasing our funding support. At the

outset, we felt poised for FY2020 to be a banner year.

And FY2020 was, in fact, a good year. The premature closure of schools and community health clinics in March resulted in a disappointing year end, but up until that point, things were fantastic. We held a fun golf tournament in April followed by an exceptional 2019 gala in November. Our Sipping for Sight event scheduled for March 15th was postponed and ultimately refashioned to be a series of FY21 virtual tastings held over the course of 2020. With our children's programs, despite the school closures, we served the second-largest number of children the organization has ever helped, vision screening 38,387 children in 686 schools across the state. Similarly, our Vision Outreach Services program which provides a range of different vision services for adults who are uninsured or under insured, reached more than 4,100 people. In the end, 2020 did not end up being the record-setting year for service and resource development that we had hoped. However, the amazing thing is, that, despite considerable set-backs, the organization still managed to provide strong levels of outreach and service, furthering our mission to prevent blindness and preserve sight.

We're grateful to our corporate, foundation, and community partners as well as our individual donors who made this work possible. We could not have done the work we did without our supporters who we are very pleased to recognize on the pages that follow.

We appreciate all that each of you has done to help us further our vision as we work to safeguard yours.

Over the last 10 years, Prevent Blindness Georgia has provided 14,206 pairs of new prescription glasses free of charge to people in need. In the 2019 - 2020 program year, Prevent Blindness Georgia vision screened or provided complete eye exams to 42,419 people across 143 (90%) of Georgia's counties. Last year, Prevent Blindness Georgia's 15 trained vision screeners visited 686 Head Starts, preschools, and Kindergartens to vision screen more than 38,000 children.




Our programs served people from 122 of Georgia's 159 counties.


We helped 38,387 young child learn to read and succeed academically by providing free vision screening finding 12% had parents and teachers who had not yet realized they needed eyeglasses.

Prevent Blindness Georgia's 2nd Annual Swing Fore Sight tournament was held on April 16, 2019 at the Piedmont Driving Club.

The event honored two esteemed members of the Georgia vision community: Dr. Barry Lee and Dr. Jonathan Woolfson. Past President of the Georgia Society of Ophthalmology and Vice President of the Cornea Society, Dr. Lee is affiliated with Piedmont Healthcare, Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, and Navicent Healthcare in Macon. He has also been the Medical Director of the Georgia Eye Bank since 2009 and has been named both an *Atlanta Top Doctor* and a *Best Doctor in America*. His co-honoree, Dr. Woolfson,

is the founder and Medical Director of Woolfson Eye Institute.He has performed more than 100,000 LASIK eye procedures.

The Prevent Blindness Georgia golf tournament offered golfers a unique spin on the traditional closest



to the pin contest, assigning all golfers a vision challenge such as cataracts, glaucoma, or macular degeneration. Each golfer had to swing while wearing special eyeglasses designed to simulate the eye condition.







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Georgia's Story

Vision problems in young children are often mistaken for academic or behavioral problems. Children who have never seen well, don't know that they don't see well. The world looks the same to them as it always has.

Four-year-old Georgia was one such young child whose vision problems were not immediately detected. Because she was barely speaking, her parents enrolled her in speech therapy. She wasn't paying attention well in school and kept to herself somewhat on the playground.

Both her parents and teachers were surprised when Prevent Blindness visited her school and she couldn't pass a vision screening. She was referred to an eye doctor for evaluation. The doctor reported that she had one of the worst cases of near-sightedness he had ever seen in a child.



Immediately after receiving her new glasses, Georgia exclaimed, "Now I can see you, Mommy!" Her words came much more frequently as the world around her began to make more sense. She was able to make friends more easily and interact with her peers now that she could see their faces clearly. She became more attentive in school and started loving art and drawing.

There is a strong correlation between children's vision and academic performance. An estimated 80% of what young children learn is learned visually.

Some vision problems in children can become permanent and can even lead to blindness without early detection and intervention.

Sadly, 49% of the children in our state do not have a vision screening before beginning school.

In a typical year, our children's vision program, Star Pupils, reaches about 40,000 three, four, and five yearold children in our state. Last year, despite the early school closures, our dedicated team of professionally trained and certified vision screeners were able to reach 38,387 children.
